THE COLLEGE

Mount Royal College, Calgary, operates under charter from the Alberta Government, is in affiliation with the University of Alberta, and is one unit in the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the United Church of Canada. It offers courses in several fields of study, including complete High School courses; first year University in Arts and Science, and Petroleum and other Engineering courses; specialized Commercial training and Business Administration; Music; Speech and Drama; as well as many courses in Adult Education.

The College is situated in the west end of the foothills city of Calgary. The main buildings overlook the Mewata Athletic Park and the beautiful valley of the Bow River. In the far distance the snowclad peaks of the Rocky Mountains can be seen from the dormitory windows. The College is easy of access from any part of the city but yet sufficiently secluded to give the atmosphere of quiet and study. It was founded in 1910 by Dr. G. W. Kerby who was its first Principal. He continued in office until July 1942, when he was succeeded by Dr. John H. Garden. Throughout the years the College has made steady progress until today it is recognized as one of the leading institutions of learning in Western Canada with a high level of scholarship and efficient training, and is widely known for sound scholarship and friendly College life.

While it is the ambition of the College to graduate students of good scholarship and high intellectual standing, it is also concerned that its graduates attain social, physical and emotional maturity with the best qualities of Canadian citizenship. The teachers are not only highly qualified academically, but have a deep interest in the all round development of their students.

The co-educational plan of the College affords students an opportunity for healthy social and emotional development. 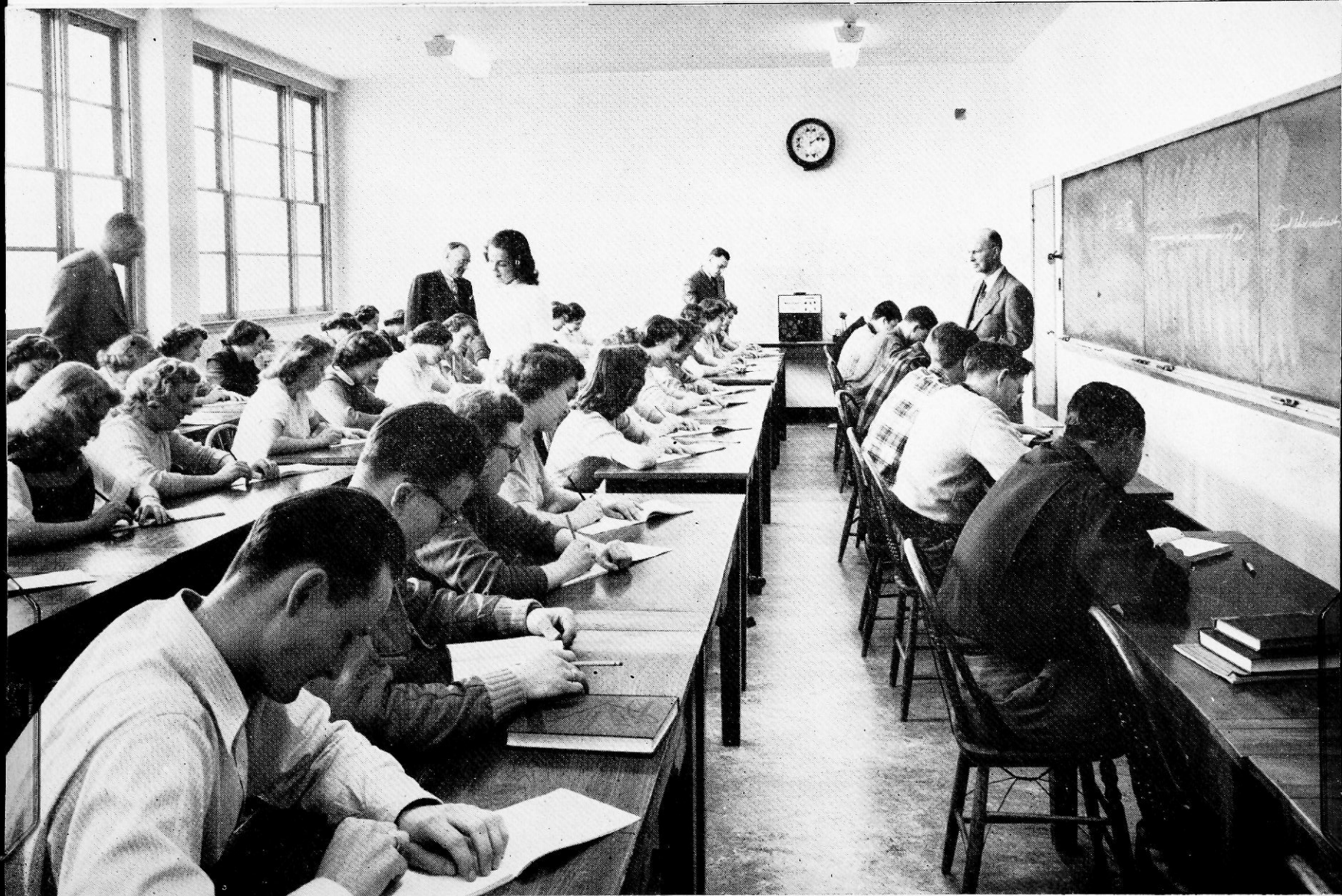

1. COMMERCIAL AND BUSINESS DEPARTMENT

Specialized Training for Careers in Commerce

Mount Royal College offers specialized commercial training to students who wish to qualify for positions in the business and industrial world. For the secretarial courses it is preferable that applicants have a high school diploma or at least eighty-five high school credits. The courses are planned to enable the student to assume secretarial responsibilities with understanding and skill in whatever kind of business or professional activity he or she may wish to enter. In selecting a College for your business education you are taking one of the most important steps in your life because the success of your chosen career depends on the quality of the training you receive. Mount Royal College is recognized as one of the most outstanding institutions of its kind in Canada.

Graduates in a Preferred Class

Today the leading corporations and business men are seeking College-trained men and women and there are not sufficient numbers to supply the demand. Therefore our graduates, as College-trained persons, find themselves in a preferred class when applying for positions. For this reason we are unable to supply the demand for Mount Royal College trained office personnel. The best firms in Calgary look upon Mount Royal College as the logical place to secure competent, high-grade office help. Our policy of requiring our Commercial students to have a good high school background, gives them a better basis for their training and makes it easier to place them in good positions on graduation. Mount Royal College graduated students command preferred positions and are paid premium salaries.

Share in the Advantages of a Real College

The Business and Commercial students share the same opportunities and privileges enjoyed by those in university and high school courses. They have the privilege of living in the College residence and sharing in all the social and cultural advantages of the College. The opportunity of intimate association with our staff and faculty is available to all and many Commercial graduates speak in the highest terms of what this has meant to them all through their lives. In addition the students in our Commercial Department can become members of the various musical and amusement clubs and of the teams and groups associated with the College Gymnasium. Despite all these important advantages the tuition fees at Mount Royal College are kept low so that a greater number may enjoy its privileges.

High School Credits Obtainable During Course

Commercial students at Mount Royal College have a decided advantage in being able to obtain credits for the commercial subjects of Shorthand, Typewriting and Bookkeeping. Thus deficiencies in credits for high school diplomas can be made up. Furthermore, should a student wish to take a couple of academic high school subjects towards senior matriculation, this can be done along with the Stenographic Course.

Diplomas Are Awarded on Graduation

Mount Royal College diplomas are presented at Convocation in June to all those who have successfully completed their courses. Certificates are issued to those with partial courses. The Certificates can be exchanged for a diploma when the student completes his course. A Mount Royal College Commercial Diploma is highly regarded by employers of office help.

Placement Service

The College maintains a placement service to assist graduates to secure satisfactory employment. This service is open to all recent and former graduates of Mount Royal College. Of late years there have been more requests from employers for Mount Royal College graduates than we have been able to supply.

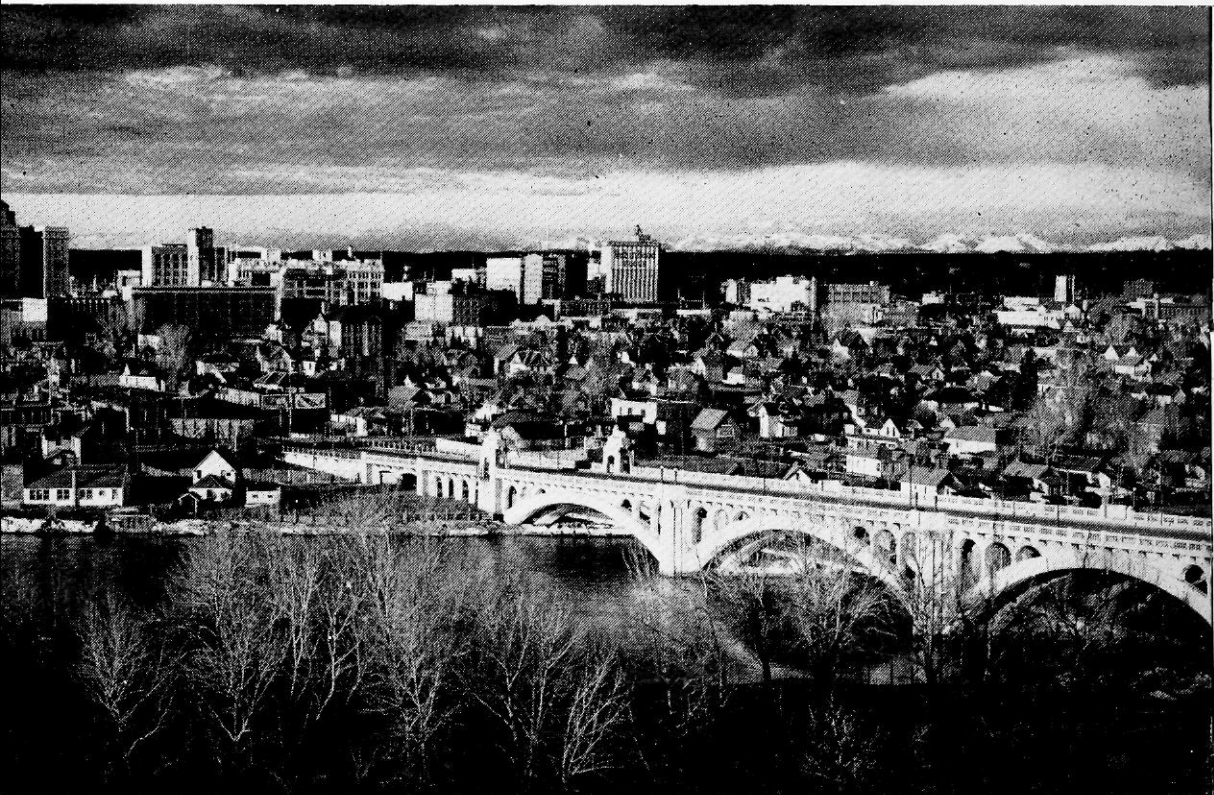

Students From Saskatchewan and British Columbia

We are happy to welcome increasing numbers of students from British Columbia and Saskatchewan to Mount Royal College (and are preparing this paragraph to appraise our courses). Our Business and Commercial diplomas are accepted in all provinces. The first year university standing is accepted at the University and is equivalent to the second year at universities that admit students with junior matriculation. Music grades and degrees are accepted everywhere. In the High School department, the standing in one province is accepted in the other and equivalent standings provided. If you purpose coming to Mount Royal College for a High School course, please send us the transcript of the marks you obtained in the earlier high school grades and we will have them evaluated and the equivalents set forth by the Department of Education of Alberta.

2. UNIVERSITY DEPARTMENT

A student can take his First Year University Course at Mount Royal College in Calgary and gain exactly the same standing as students who take their first year at the University in Edmonton.

Mount Royal College has been affiliated with the University of Alberta since 1931 and hundreds of students have begun their university training in her classrooms. First year courses are offered leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, D.D.S., B.A. and LL.B., B.A. and B.Sc. in Engineering, and B.Com. The success of our University Department has been indicated by the number of students who have won scholarships and fellowships in their subsequent work.

Mount Royal College Associate in Arts Diploma is awarded to all students successfully passing the first year University courses.

 4. Trigonometry and Analytical Geometry
 5. Physics 2
 6. Chemistry 2
 7. French 3 or German 3 or Latin 3

Note: Applications for first year D.D.S. must be received before August 31st.

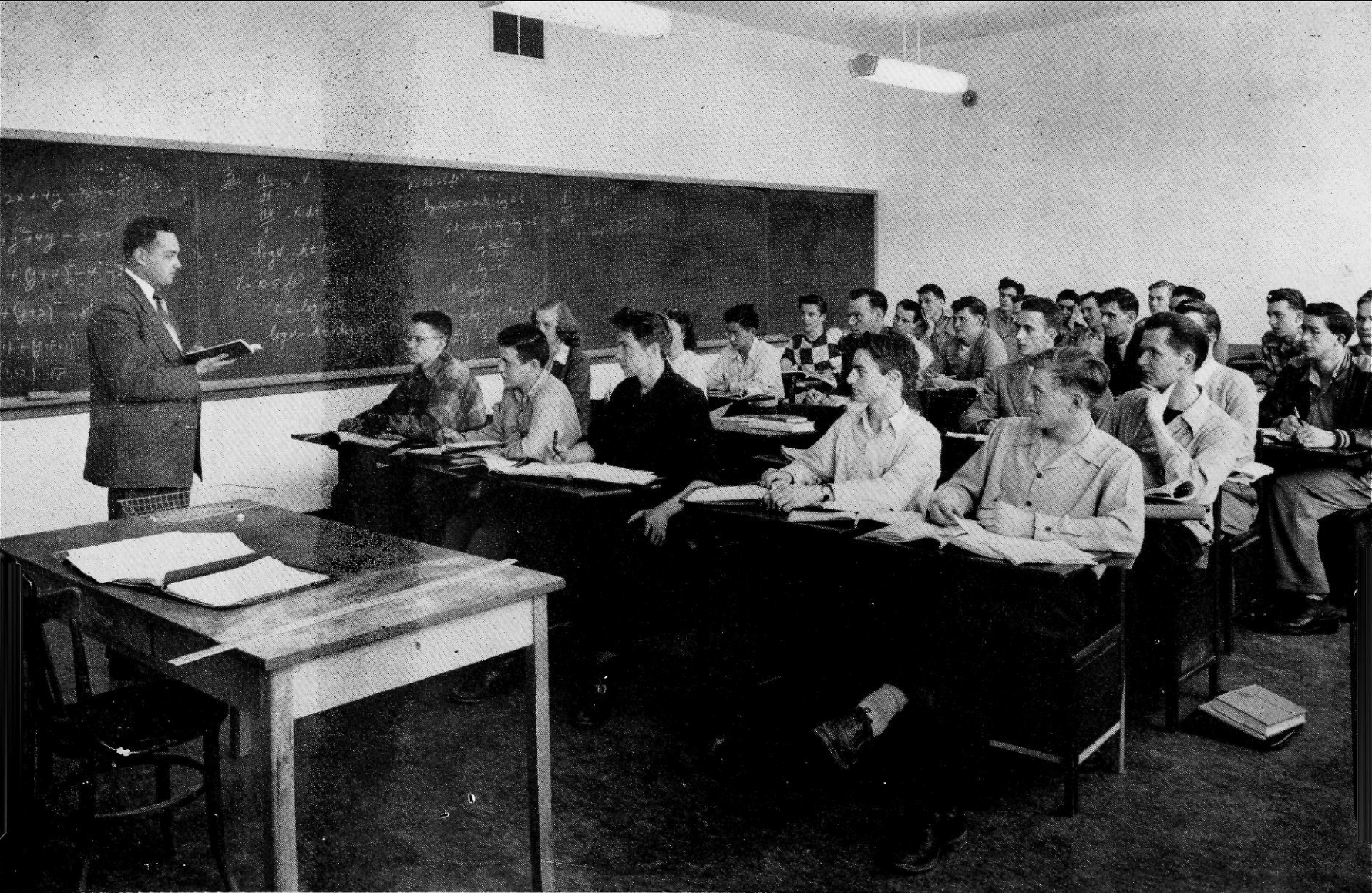
3. For degree of B.A. only, in case of students interested primarily in languages and social studies; at least B standing in the following courses of Grade XII and their prerequisite courses —
 1. English 3
 2. Social Studies 3
 3. Third unit of a foreign language
 4. Third unit of a second foreign language
 5. 6. and 7. Three of: Algebra 2, Trigonometry and Analytical Geometry, Physics 2 or Chemistry 2, Biology 2
4. To students with Alberta High School Graduation Diplomas who have not been able to obtain all the required courses of matriculation because such courses have not been available in the school attended, we may offer courses at Grade XII level in French, Latin, Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry and Physics. For admission, the requirement will be at least B standing in the High School Graduation Diploma, including English and Social Studies, and a letter from the principal of your high school stating that the deficient course was not available in the school.

Revised Matriculation Requirements

When the contemplated changes in the Grade XII curriculum have been brought about, the revised matriculation requirements will come into effect.



CLASS IN UNIVERSITY MATHEMATICS

A. FACULTY OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

The courses for the degrees of B.A. and B.Sc. in the Faculty of Arts and Science are organized into patterns which represent both a field of concentration and specified courses outside of that field. Students registering for their first year will select a particular pattern and register as specified in that pattern. Every student in the first year is assigned to a consultant whose advice will be available at time of registration or at any other time during the session. In their second and third years these students will register as prescribed for the pattern selected in the first year.

Selection of Courses

Following are the first year courses required for the various degrees:

1. B.A. PATTERNS—

ENGLISH: English 2, French 2 or Latin 2, History 2, Philosophy 2 or Political Economy 1, a Laboratory Science or a Mathematics course.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE: French 2 or Latin 2; one of German 1, French 2, Latin 2; English 2; one of Philosophy 2, History 2, Political Economy 1; a Laboratory Science or a Mathematics course.

FINE ARTS: French 2 or Latin 2; a second foreign language or approved option; English 2; one of Philosophy 2, History 2, or Political Economy 1; Laboratory Science or a Mathematics course.

PHILOSOPHY AND PSYCHOLOGY: Philosophy 2; History 2 or Political Economy 1; English 2; one of Political Economy 1, History 2, French 2, Latin 2; a Laboratory Science or a Mathematics course.

HISTORY: History 2; Political Economy 1; Philosophy 2 or a foreign language; English 2 or a foreign language; a Laboratory Science or a Mathematics course.

POLITICAL ECONOMY: Political Economy 1; History 2; Philosophy 2; English 2 or French 2 or Latin 2; a Laboratory Science or a Mathematics course.

Note: In the English, Philosophy and Political Economy Patterns, a beginner's language may, with special permission, be elected as an option in the second or third year.

2. B.Sc. PATTERNS—

CHEMISTRY: Chemistry 40, Mathematics 40, Physics 40, Zoology 1 or Botany 1, English 2.

MATHEMATICS: Same as Chemistry Pattern.

PHYSICS: Same as Chemistry and Mathematics Patterns.

3. OTHER COURSES:

First year courses in the Faculty of Arts and Science leading to an Honours Degree, the combined degrees of B.A., LL.B., or B.Sc., D.D.S., and to the Faculty of Medicine may be taken at Mount Royal College.

Details of Courses

CHEMISTRY 40—Inorganic Chemistry.

3 hrs. lect., 3 hrs. lab.

Lectures: Chemistry of metals and their compounds. The principles of chemical analysis.

Laboratory: Qualitative inorganic analysis.

ENGLISH 2—

3 hrs.

A close study of representative masterpieces, with some attention to the historical development of English Literature. Essays and tests on the prescribed literature will be given to afford practice in setting down ideas in good English.

Details of Courses (Continued)

HISTORY 10

3 hrs. lect., 1 hr. conf.

The history of Europe from the Decline of the Roman Empire in the West to the Present.

Books: First term, Collins, History of Medieval Civilization;

second term, Palmer, History of the Modern World.

FRENCH 2—

3 hrs.

This is an intensive course in reading modern French, French grammar and composition.

Prerequisite: Grade XII French.

MATHEMATICS 40—

3 hrs. lect., 2 hrs. lab.

Calculus and Plane Analytical Geometry

Functions of one variable; plane curves; the process of differentiation and integration; applications.

Text-book: Middlemiss, Calculus.

Prerequisites: Algebra 2, Trigonometry and Analytical Geometry.

PHYSICS 40—Elementary Physics

3 hrs. lect., 2 hrs. lab.

Mechanics, properties of matter, heat, sound and light. Illustrated by experiment.

POLITICAL ECONOMY 1—Principles of Economics

3 hrs.

A general introduction to the study of the tendencies underlying the wealth-getting and wealth-using activities of man. In this course there will be two lectures a week and the class will be divided into discussion groups for the third hour.

PSYCHOLOGY 40—

3 hrs.

A survey of problems, methods and principles in the various fields of Psychology.

ZOOLOGY 1—Animal Biology

3 hrs. lect., 3 hrs. lab.

Animal organization; comparative morphology and anatomy; essentials of histology; principal phenomena of distribution, behaviour, ecology, development and reproduction; evolution, variation and heredity.

B. THE FACULTY OF ENGINEERING

Since 1943 Mount Royal College has been offering the first two years of B.Sc. in Petroleum Engineering and Geological Engineering. Students passing with at least 60% are accepted for the third year at the Oklahoma State University in Norman, Oklahoma, and also at other U.S.A. universities. This work has been so successful that students taking the first two years at Mount Royal College can now transfer into any of the following courses leading to B.Sc. in Aeronautical, Chemical, Civil, Electric, Mechanical and Natural Gas Engineering in addition to Petroleum and Geological Engineering.

The entrance requirement for B.Sc. in the Engineering Course desired is junior matriculation or the equivalent.

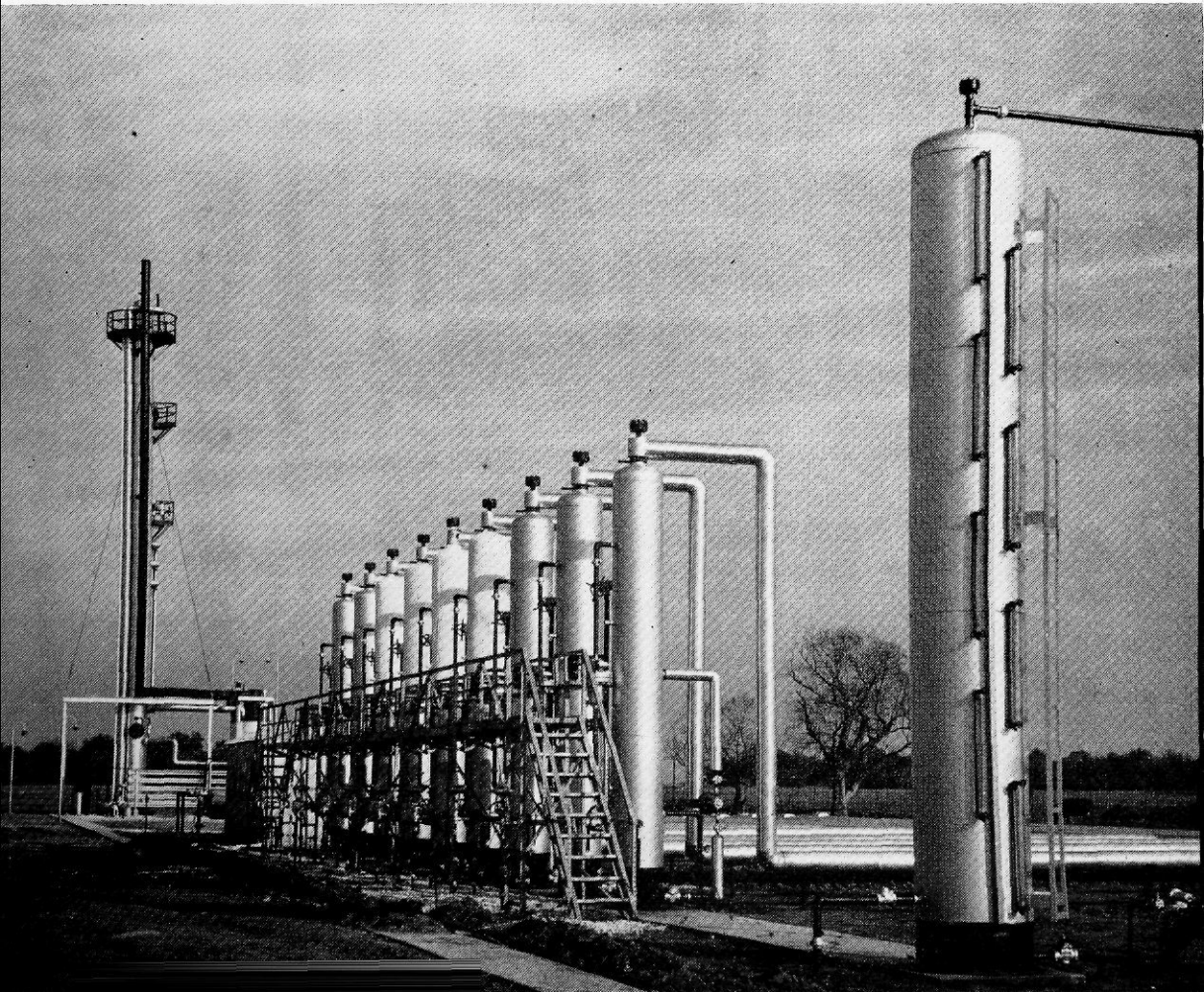

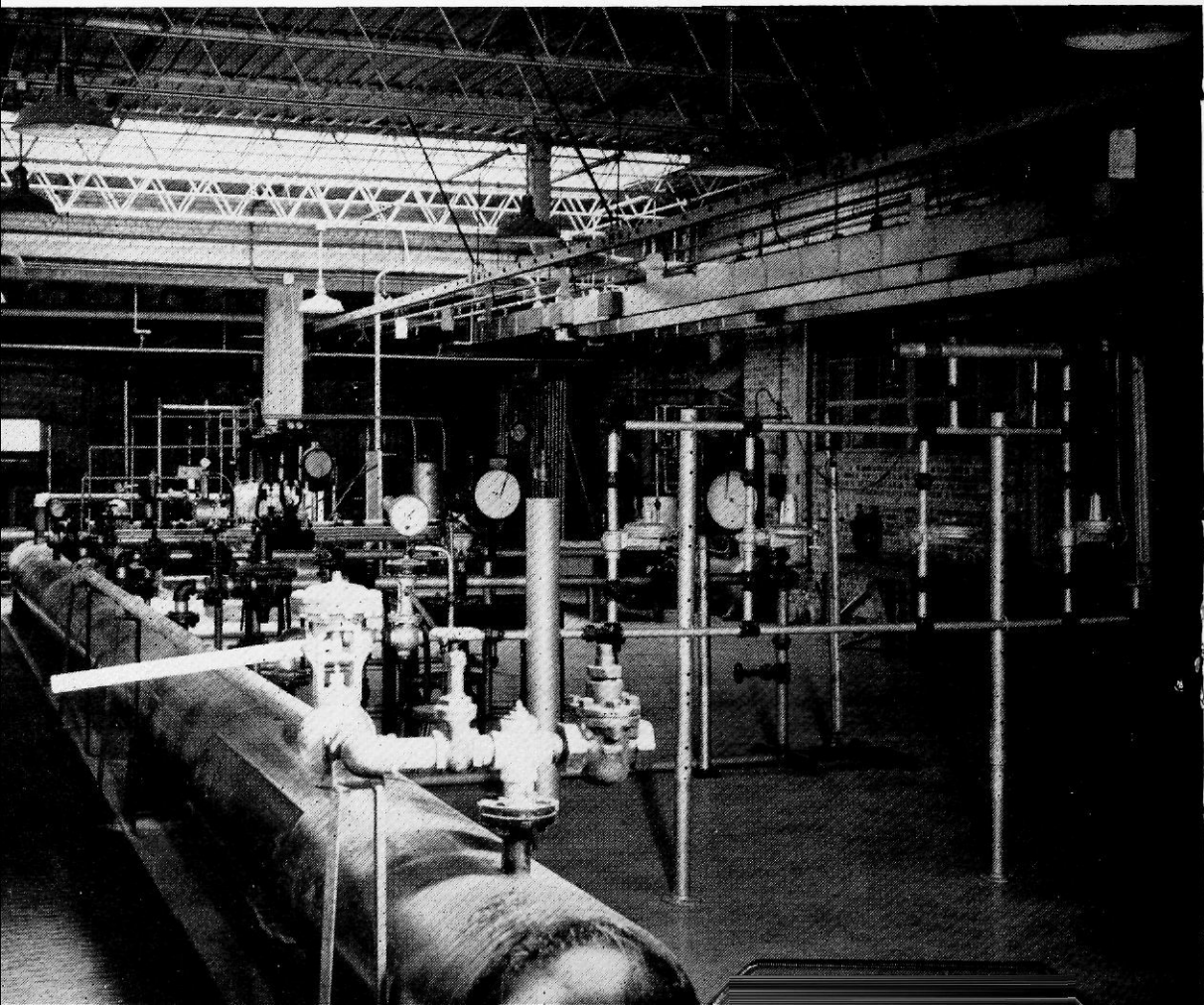

Limited accommodation in one of the annexes to the Mount Royal College Residence Building is provided for students registered in the Second Year of Petroleum Engineering. Applications for admission to the Engineers' House must be submitted early and will be considered in the order that they are received.

3. THE EVENING COLLEGE

The Evening College was established as a department of the educational program of Mount Royal College in the fall of 1948. The purpose was to extend to adult members of the community an opportunity to commence or continue studies in areas of their own interest. The process of education does not finish with the completion of a formal education but may continue to enrich the years of mature living. It has been the purpose of the Evening College to give to its students any course which they may request. Should a minimum of six students desire any course, the course will be organized.

Admission

The requirement for admission to the Evening College is the interest of the student and the desire to learn. No standard of formal education is required.

Course Credit

Each course offered in the Evening College carries credit on the Mount Royal College Evening College Diploma, providing attendance is regular and examinations are written. A course of 10 hours' lectures will be awarded one credit. A course of 20 hours' lectures will be awarded two credits.

A student who finishes a course successfully will be granted a certificate of merit.

The Evening College Diplomas are presented annually in the month of June at the regular Mount Royal College Convocation.

CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY

Candidates for the ministry who enroll in Mount Royal College have the following advantages:

4. THE HIGH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

The main purpose of the High School Department is to guide students to a Senior Matriculation and to lay a solid foundation of academic studies for young people who are looking forward to a university career. Students will find that the High School Department is designed for academic work. Graduates of this department will leave the College to pursue studies in many Canadian and United States universities. In order that students looking forward to engineering courses may not find themselves limited, a course in Trigonometry and Analytical Geometry will be offered to Grade XII students.

While students who are not planning to attend university will be accepted as far as accommodation will permit, these students will of necessity take an academic course including a wide selection of Commercial and other electives leading to a High School Diploma.

THE SEMESTER SYSTEM will be introduced into Mount Royal College with the new term which commences on September 8th, 1953. A full academic year will consist of two semesters. The Fall Semester will commence on September 8th and conclude on December 4th. The Spring Semester will open on December 7th and end on June 30th, 1954.

During each semester every subject in the High School curriculum will be offered. At the end of each semester final examinations will be written. Thus in Mount Royal College final examinations will be written at the end of December and June. Under this system students will be able to complete a full year's work without difficulty. For example, a student seeking 37 High School credits may register for 13 credits in the Fall Semester and 24 credits in the Spring Semester. In the Fall Semester each subject will be taught two hours per day, and in the Spring Semester each subject will be taught one hour per day.

Students must be aware that, with the intensive study required under the semester system, regular attendance at classes is absolutely essential.

The advantage of the semester system is that intensive work is done on a limited number of subjects for a shorter period. A more efficient mastery of subject matter is thereby obtained. Students requiring one or two subjects to complete a Senior Matriculation may attend one semester instead of ten months, as previously.

ADMISSION—Students will make application for admission to Mount Royal College on the prescribed form, which must be carefully and accurately completed. Admission will be on the basis of a full academic year and the programs will be arranged on the semester basis. Applications for admission should be made as early in August as possible. Students will be admitted only after their academic record and characters have been carefully reviewed. The number admitted to any class will be strictly limited and applications will be considered in the order that they are received.

HIGH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT (Continued)

ONE SEMESTER STUDENTS—A limited number of students will be accepted for one semester only. These students will be individuals whose high school programs may be completed in one semester or whose family or personal circumstances prevent a full year's attendance. Applications of these students for admission to the Fall Semester must be in the Registrar's office before August 15, 1953, and for admission to the Spring Semester before November 15, 1953.

REGISTRATION—Preliminary registration, adjustments of program and arrangement of time tables should be discussed well in advance of the opening date of either Semester. Advisors will be available for the Fall Semester during the period August 17th to September 5th. Final registration for the Fall Semester will be made on September 8th and 9th. Registration arrangements for the Spring Semester must be made between November 23rd and December 4th.

STUDENT GUIDANCE—Students will arrange time tables and programs in consultation with the Dean of Mount Royal College. Attention must be paid to the proposed changes in the Alberta High School Curriculum. No student will be allowed to change his course after the Semester has commenced. A student may register in as many as 15 credits for the Fall Semester and in as many as 30 credits for the Spring Semester. No more than 40 credits will be allowed in any one year. Under the semester system it is possible for a Grade XII student to complete Senior Matriculation in one year.

GRADUATION—A student may graduate from Mount Royal College under one or more of the following plans:

- (1) Senior Matriculation, which admits him to the University of Alberta. Attention is directed to the revised matriculation requirements: (a) a High School Diploma, (b) 60% average in Language 30, Social Studies 30, Mathematics 30, French 30 or German 30 or Latin 30, and two of Science 30, Science 31, Science 32, a second Grade XII Language. Students who commenced High School under the former matriculation requirements will be allowed to complete their program in conformity to that.
- (2) High School Diploma of the Province of Alberta, which requires at least 100 credits distributed according to the requirements of the Department of Education.
- (3) Mount Royal College High School Diploma, which requires the completion of a High School Diploma together with certain courses in General Education. This diploma is awarded at the June convocation of the College.

TIME TABLES—In the Fall Semester a five-credit subject will be taught two hours per day Monday through Friday.

In the Spring Semester a five-credit subject will be taught one hour per day Monday through Friday.

ATTENDANCE—Regular attendance is required by the Department of Education and credits may be disallowed if the student does not comply with the regulations. Because of the pressure of work under the Semester System a student who is irregular in attendance will be unable to continue.

REPORTS—Progress reports will be prepared in October, February and April and will be mailed to the parents for their information. Since final examinations will be written in December and June, the results of these examinations will be sent by the Department of Education.

GUIDANCE—The College places great importance on student guidance which is directed by the Guidance Committee of the Faculty and is the responsibility of the Home Room Teacher. Mental Ability, Aptitude, Interest and Diagnostic tests are administered as the need arises.

THE SUMMER SCHOOLS

1. THE SUMMER SEMESTER

A Summer Semester of six weeks' duration is held in July and August of each year to enable students to complete Senior Matriculation or a High School Diploma. Because of the limited time in the Summer Semester it is strongly recommended that one senior matriculation subject be attempted. A student may register in two subjects with the approval of the Dean of Mount Royal College. Each subject required for senior matriculation will be taught in its entirety. Students will write the supplemental examinations as set in August by the Department of Education. A folder giving detailed information will be mailed on request.

2. THE COACHING SCHOOL FOR GRADE XII SUPPLEMENTAL EXAMINATIONS

Each year as soon as the results from the June examinations are known, Mount Royal College conducts a coaching school for students who require help in preparing for the supplemental examinations. Qualified and experienced teachers are secured to give a thorough and comprehensive review of all Grade XII subjects. Information concerning the coaching school may be secured from the Registrar.

5. THE CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC

It offers diploma courses in Music and Speech, and is happy to co-operate with other institutions in preparing students for their diplomas. A high standard of musical and speech ability is required.

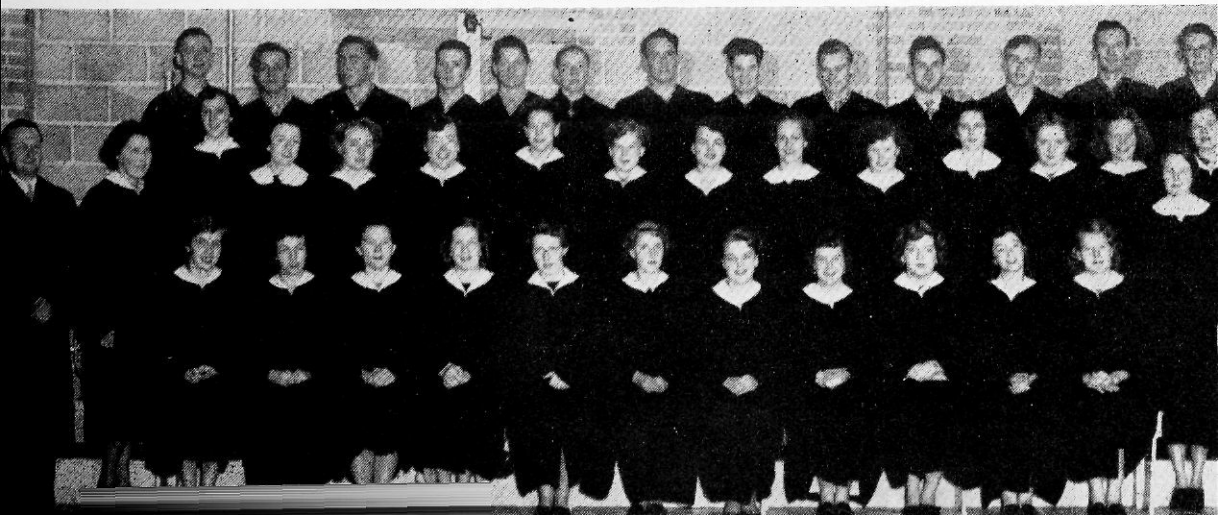

F. Theory Department — Private and class lessons.

1. Class and private training in Theory, Harmony, Counterpoint, Form, Composition, History, Orchestration, Pedagogy, Ear Training, Choral and Orchestral Conducting and Chamber Music.
2. Music Appreciation Classes, one hour per week, \$5.00 per ten-week term. This course will include a general survey and appreciation of the great works of music literature from the contrapuntal school of Palestrina through the classic and romantic styles of the great composers up to and including impressionistic and modern contemporary music. The best recordings of the great masters will be played and commented upon and many taking the course will be given the opportunity to perform compositions for appreciation and discussion.
3. Music Theory Classes, forty-five minutes per week, \$5.00 per ten-week term. These classes in elementary theory are divided into two courses. The Theory I course covers the requirements for Toronto Conservatory Grade I Theory, Western Board (University of Alberta) Grades I and II theory, and Royal Schools Stage I theory.

The Theory II course covers the requirements for Toronto Conservatory Grade II theory, Western Board Grades III and IV theory, and Royal Schools Stages II and III theory.

4. Ear-Training and Sight-Reading Classes, one hour per week, \$2.00 to \$5.00 per ten-week term. These classes are designed to improve the student's ability to read at sight, as well as train the ear to appreciate and recognize such necessary examination requirements as intervals, rhythms, cadences, chord construction, etc. All students taking private lessons at the Conservatory are urged to take advantage of these most important classes, and any students planning to take music examinations in singing or any instrument are definitely required to attend these necessary ear-training and sight-reading classes, which the Conservatory has arranged for their special benefit.

F. Speech and Drama Department—Private and Class Lessons

For many years the Speech and Drama Department of Mount Royal College has been concentrating its activities on a course which would embrace all forms of theatre arts, and now feels it has reached the position when it is able to give training in the technique of voice production and bodily control, to develop actors, speakers and interpreters who possess a pleasing voice, cultured diction and a graceful body.

SPEECH — The department offers a complete and intensive instruction in the art of good speech, involving a study of the physiology of the human voice and a thorough plan of practical voice training to develop the speaking voice to its fullest proficiency in all situations, such as public speaking, verse reading, story telling, interpretative reading and choral speech. Such training offers an understanding and appreciation of literature and drama, and the experience gained in the proper oral presentation of one's thoughts and ideas makes for increased mental alertness and a more attractive personality in social, business and professional life. It also meets the needs of those who desire success on the stage, in radio broadcasting and on the platform.

ACTING — Since acting is the perfect co-ordination of voice and body to create a character, the theatre division also offers excellent instruction in:

PANTOMIME — The art of pantomime is the basic foundation of all acting, for an actor must remind himself constantly that man speaks not by the voice alone, but by the movement of every muscle in his body. It sharpens the imagination and develops a good sense of timing and control of movement.

MOVEMENT — Exercises in limbering and relaxing to ensure freedom and ease of movement; and training in balanced gesture emanating from thought and emotion.

MAKE-UP — Proper characterization in appearance is expected of every actor. Therefore the art of Make-Up is necessary for the picture that he represents to an audience. This course is essentially based on studies from life and is invaluable in increasing the student's power of observation. It teaches the student to transform his face into any desired type, age or nationality. Classes in **wig-making**, **mask-making**, **stagecraft**, are also offered.

POISE AND DEPARTMENT FOR THE STAGE — Classes will be given for all students of music and speech in the Conservatory.

CHILDREN'S THEATRE — Special emphasis is being directed to classes in Children's Theatre, where boys and girls from ten years of age and upwards are given an extensive training in gaining a complete understanding of all phases in the technique of dramatization.

COURSES — Students are prepared for the examinations of the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto (Speech and Drama Department) from Grade I to the final A.R.C.T. diploma, and also the Mount Royal College, A.M.R.C. and L.M.R.C. diplomas. Theory examinations take place in February and practical examinations in June.

THE COLLEGE RESIDENCES

Well-equipped residences for both young women and young men are maintained for the convenience of out-of-town students who attend the College. Some Calgary students may be admitted by special request. All students whose homes are not in the city are expected to avail themselves of the accommodation supplied by the residences, with the exception of those who have relatives in Calgary and also members of the University group. These may secure special permission from the Principal.

Resident students are under the care of the deans of the residences. The superior educational advantages of this need not be emphasized. It is our experience that students coming from a distance, who do not go into residence, cannot successfully compete with those who enjoy the home life of the College. The regular study periods, the personal contact with the teachers, and association with other students taking the same work are advantages that cannot be overestimated.

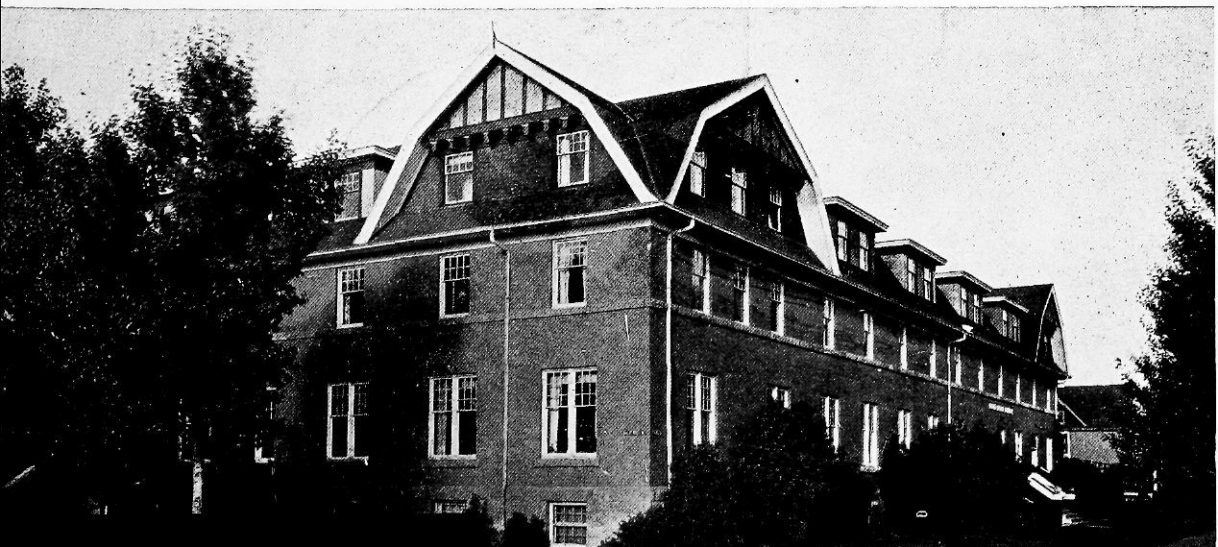
Residences for Girls and Young Ladies

The women's residence has a southern exposure and provides attractive and homelike accommodation. Well-kept lawns, with flowers, shrubbery, and shade trees add a touch of beauty, and recreation rooms with piano and other musical instruments help to make this a comfortable home. The residence is supervised by a lady dean who is a companion to the girls and helps in promoting sport, organizing hikes and in developing proper manners and good habits of life. Talks are given on etiquette and deportment and every effort is made to maintain a refined and healthful atmosphere in the ordering of everything connected with the management of the residence.

Residences for Boys and Young Men

The men's residence faces the west and commands an excellent view of the Bow Valley with the mountains in the distance. It is under the care of a competent dean who, as companion to the boys, is able to help them in many of their problems and give leadership in their activities. The educational value of residence life is very great where the boys meet one another upon a basis of equality and the consideration of the needs and rights of one another is developed.

Rooms in Both Residences

The rooms in both the women's and men's residences are very similar. They are large, well ventilated, comfortably heated by steam and suitably furnished, single beds being used throughout. Each room is occupied by two students, with the exception of a few large rooms that may accommodate more in an emergency. A few single rooms are available at an extra charge of five dollars a month.

Both men and women students are required to make their own beds each morning and maintain an orderly room, which must be ready for inspection by 8:30 a.m. daily. **Rooms are assigned to students in order of application. No room can be reserved until the application fee is paid.** After assignment, rooms may be changed only by consent of the dean. Students may indicate on their application forms the roommate desired.

Dress and Outfit

There is no uniformity of dress required. The student's outfit should be neat, warm and simple. The College colors are blue and white, which should suggest appropriate colors for sweaters, etc.

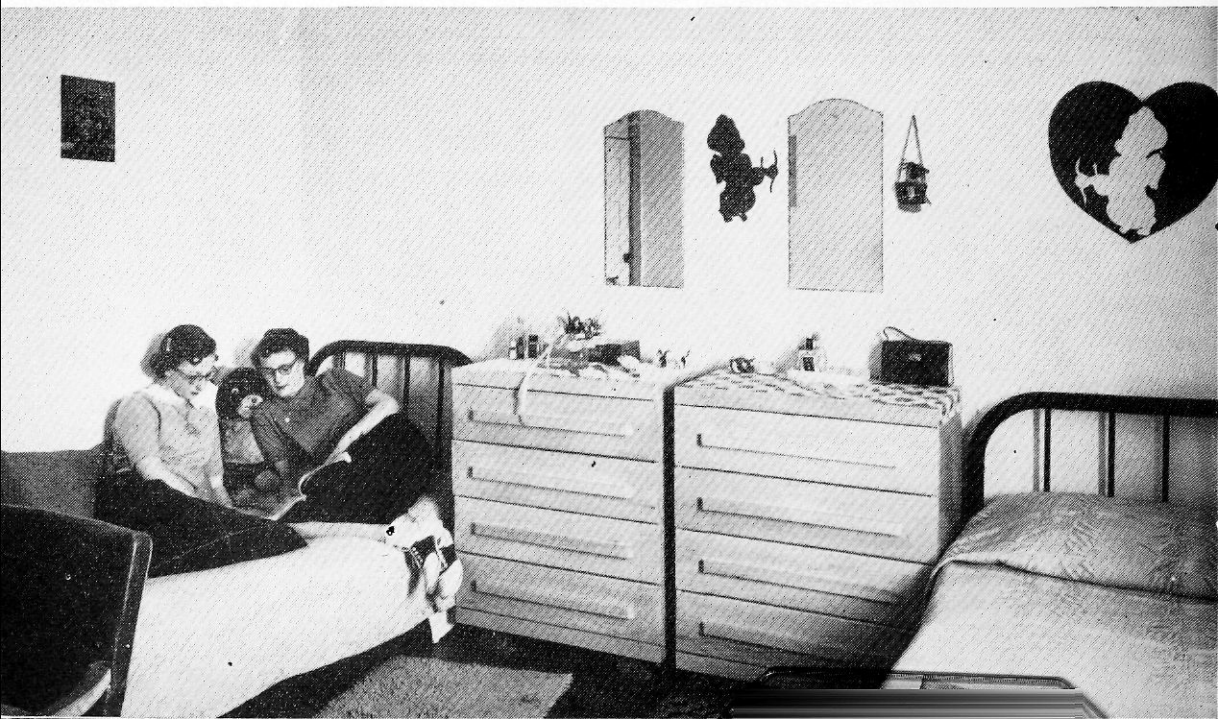

Laundry Service

All resident students are required to keep their sheets, towels and personal clothing laundered regularly. The College operates a laundry service, whereby students' laundry is cared for by the Ontario Laundry, and is handled through the College. A deposit of \$3.00 per month is required of each student. The actual cost will be charged to each student and an adjustment either way made at the end of the year.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Regulations

System, order and regulations are essential to school life. Admission to the school implies a contract to observe the regulations of the College. They are just and reasonable and in the best interests of all. Their violation may lead to expulsion from the College.

- (1) The use or possession of intoxicants is prohibited.
- (2) Boisterous conduct, offensive and obscene language are forbidden.
- (3) The use of fire escapes or windows to leave or enter the College, or the possession of unauthorized keys is forbidden.
- (4) Regular attendance at classes is required of all students.
- (5) Smoking is prohibited in the bedrooms, halls and classrooms of the College. Students who have the consent of their parents may smoke in the rooms set aside for this purpose. The College definitely discourages the use of tobacco by junior boys and girls still in high school.
- (6) The College will not be responsible for money, valuables or clothes left in halls or rooms. Deposits of money may be placed with the registrar and withdrawals made at specified times.
- (7) Resident students are not permitted to remain out of residence over night unless they have WRITTEN PERMISSION from their parents, which must be sent to the dean of the residence. On Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights and Saturday mornings, students are required to study, but on Friday and Saturday evenings (provided there is no function at the College, students may go out to visit friends and attend places of wholesome amusement, but must report back at the College by 12:00 p.m. (Sunday 10:00 p.m.). Special leaves may be granted by written permission from the dean. To allow opportunity for out-of-town students to visit their homes, a few long week-ends are granted.

NOTE: Parents are asked to send the dean of the residence the names and addresses of people in Calgary who may be visited by their children.

- (8) Students are urged to attend the church of their choice each Sunday morning.

2. The Care of Health

At entrance, all resident students are required to present a certificate of health from their family physician or take an examination by the College physician, which costs \$3.00. We recommend that all students be inoculated against contagious diseases, and URGENTLY ASK THAT A STUDENT DO NOT RETURN TO COLLEGE AFTER BEING EXPOSED TO A CONTAGIOUS DISEASE UNTIL SUFFICIENT TIME HAS ELAPSED TO AVOID ALL DANGER OF INFECTING FELLOW STUDENTS. In the case of colds or minor illness, the College endeavors to give the best possible care, but experience has taught that the best policy in the case of contagious or serious illness is for the student to be placed in hospital. If a student develops a contagious or serious illness, parents are notified immediately and arrangements made for the removal of the student from the dormitory. There are rebates of fees for illness of more than 14 days. In general, the health of those in the residences is very good, with an increase of strength and weight during the year.

3. The Students' Council

The Council, composed of elected representatives of the student body, has charge of the social activities of the students and also the publication of the College papers and Year Book. Parties, dances, concerts, and meetings of literary and social clubs are held throughout the year. These contribute greatly to the cultivation of College spirit and are a vital part of the student's life. All students have the opportunity of becoming members of the Mount Royal College Glee Club, directed by Harold Ramsay.

4. Locker Service

For the benefit of day students, lockers are provided in both the boys' and girls' washrooms and are available at a nominal rental. Every day student is required to rent one in order to have a secure place for books, gymnasium shoes, etc. The College cannot assume responsibility for money or valuables lost in the washrooms. Students are asked to leave their money with the registrar and draw the same when required.

5. The College Assembly

Assembly is held each school day at 9:30 a.m. and is compulsory for all students except those in university classes and any who may secure exemption cards on conscientious grounds. This is a bright, interesting gathering when all the students get together, important announcements are given, and a variety of programs are presented. Each year the student body has the opportunity of hearing many prominent persons. Religious knowledge classes are held during the year, and satisfactory passing marks are a requirement for graduation diplomas.

6. Entrance Application and Fees

You will find an application form in the enclosed folder outlining fees, etc. Please complete the same and send to the registrar with a deposit of ten dollars, as soon as you have decided to attend the College. If a student is unable to attend, and gives at least ten days' notice before the opening of the term, the fee will be refunded.

Payment of fees in advance is a strict requirement of the College, and all financial obligations must be settled before diplomas, medals or prizes can be awarded.

7. Withdrawal From College

One month's notice in writing is required from parent or guardian before a student is permitted to withdraw from the College except at the end of the school year. Withdrawal forms are furnished on request at the office and must be filed with the registrar. No rebate is allowed for withdrawal of a student within one month before the close of the term. Students expelled for misdemeanors will have no refund of fees.

8. Caution Money and Damage to College Property

The students are responsible for the care of the College property and any damage will be charged to the student concerned.

All students in residence, and non-resident students taking science courses, are required to deposit the sum of \$5.00 as caution money. All other students will deposit \$2.00 as caution money. General breakage and damage to college property, including breakage in the science laboratories, is charged to the general caution money account, and after the close of the school year the balance remaining in this fund, if any, is returned pro rata to the depositors, less any charges which may have been made to them individually for laboratory supplies or for breakage or damage for which they may have been directly responsible.

9. Rates and Further Information

A schedule of fees and further information on any of our courses may be had on request by writing to the Registrar, Mount Royal College. You are welcome to come and visit our buildings at any time.



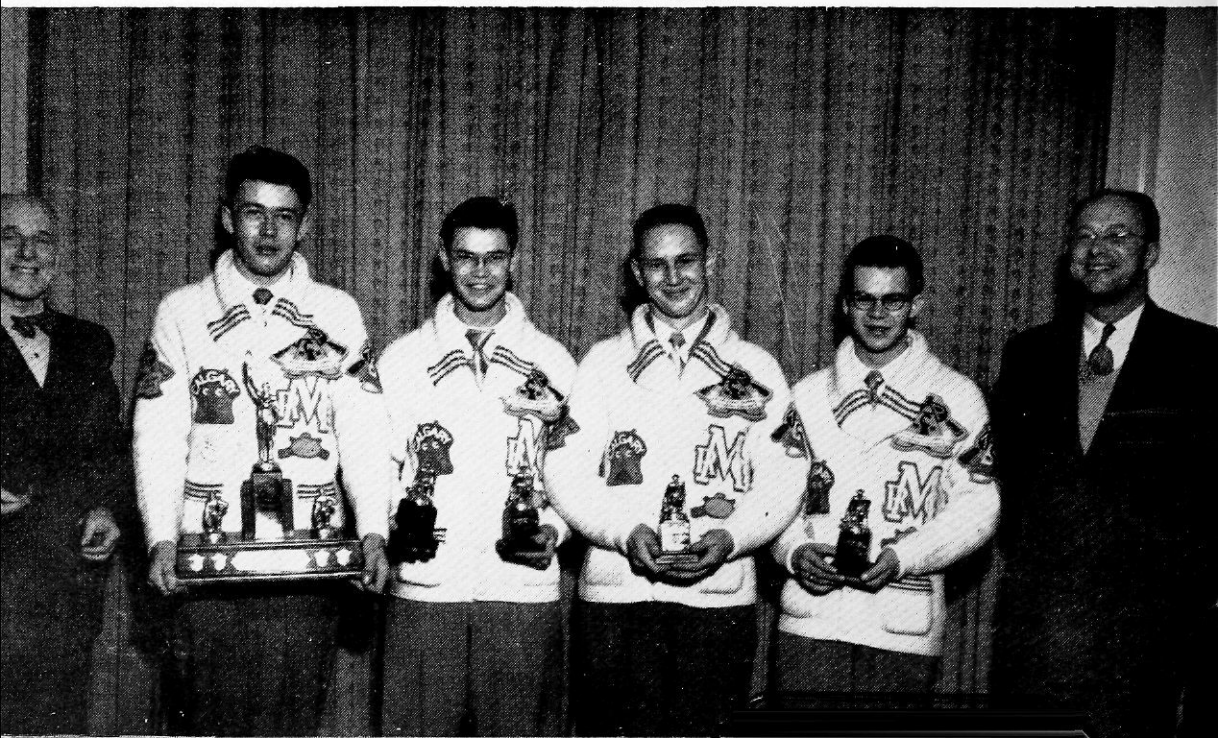
SPORTS, GYMNASIUM, AND PHYSICAL TRAINING

There is a varied program of sports and physical training. In addition to senior teams in basketball, there are house leagues in basketball, hockey, indoor hockey, badminton, etc., that are proving very popular. Each student is asked to select at least one athletic activity. We find that a reasonable amount of physical training and games are a great aid to achievement in academic studies.

SCHOLARSHIPS, BURSARIES, MEDALS AND PRIZES FOR STUDENTS IN ATTENDANCE AT MOUNT ROYAL COLLEGE

University Department

1. The Viscount Bennett Scholarships—Three scholarships of the value of \$300.00 each are available for competitive award to students from Calgary or Banff areas. These scholarships may be held in any year and course and are tenable either at Mount Royal College or at the University of Alberta.
2. The Calgary B'nai B'rith Bursary of \$25.00 offered to the Junior College first year student having the highest general standing in any two subjects in the division of Mathematics and Science.
3. The Calgary B'nai B'rith Bursary of \$25.00 offered to the Junior College first year student having the highest general standing in any two subjects in the division of Language and Literature.
4. The Calgary Section Council of Jewish Women Bursary of \$25.00 offered to the Junior College first year student having the highest general standing in any two subjects in the Division of History, Philosophy and Political Economy.
5. The Henry Birks & Sons Gold Medal offered for highest general standing in first year University courses.
6. The Board of Governor Silver Medal offered to the student making the highest general standing in second year Petroleum Engineering.
7. The City of Calgary Scholarships—Two scholarships of \$300.00 each, one to a boy and one to a girl, offered to first year University students in any faculty. Awards made on the basis of academic proficiency and of financial need, and the scholarships are tenable either at Mount Royal College or at the University of Alberta. Written applications, setting forth the financial ability of the home and other pertinent information, should be received by the City Clerk, Calgary, before August 15th. These scholarships available only to students who have attended Calgary schools for at least Grade VII to XII inclusive and whose parents have been residents of Calgary during this period.

High School Department

1. The Elizabeth H. Williams Memorial Bursary of \$50.00 offered to a student with high standing in Grade X and who is returning to the College as a resident student.
2. The Dr. G. W. Kerby Chapter I.O.D.E. Memorial Scholarship of \$50.00 awarded to a student with high standing in Grade XI.
3. The Margaret L. Carrick Scholarship of \$50.00 offered by the Mount Royal College Educational Club to a student completing a Grade XII course and who is returning to the College for further studies as a resident student. The scholarship will be awarded for proficiency in academic studies, participation in extra-curricular activities, moral character and qualities of leadership.
4. The Charles M. Hall Memorial Scholarship of \$35.00 is offered to a non-resident student of Grade XII who is returning for further study at Mount Royal College.
5. The Board of Governors Silver Medal is offered for the highest general standing in Grade XII.
6. A bronze medal is offered to the student making the highest standing in Grades X and XI courses.
7. Eric Sharples' Memorial Prize in English, open to students in Grade XI.
8. Special prizes for Christian Leadership courses.
9. Other prizes are offered to students in High School grades for proficiency in various studies.
10. Matron's Prize of \$10.00 for the best kept room in the residences.

Commercial Department

1. Special Diplomas for all who successfully complete their courses.
2. Silver Medal is offered for the highest general standing in Commercial courses.
3. Bronze Medal for the student standing second in the Commercial courses.
4. A Bronze Medal is offered for proficiency in penmanship, open to all students in the Commercial department.
5. A Special Prize for the student standing highest in the Christian Leadership course.
6. Prizes are also offered to students in this department for proficiency in various studies.

Prizes

1. Eaton Cup for Patriotic Essay (all High School grades).
2. Debating Cup for Interclass Debates (High School and Commercial departments).
3. Tennis Cup for Boys' and Girls' Singles (High School and Commercial departments).
4. Badminton Cup for Boys' and Girls' Singles (High School and Commercial departments).
5. Special Prize for Dramatics (Speech and Drama department).

All awards of scholarships, bursaries and medals to be made subject to the student's standing and record being satisfactory to the faculty council. Minimum percentages for the award of medals for academic courses are: gold, 75%; silver, 70%; bronze, 65%.

MOUNT ROYAL COLLEGE ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

A large number of scholarships are offered annually for open competition among the young men and women wishing to enter Mount Royal College for courses in first year University, High School, Commercial and Business training. The scholarships will be applied to fees after the students are in actual attendance at the College for a full session following the award, and will be credited toward defraying the fees for the latter part of the session. A student may not apply for more than one matriculation scholarship or bursary in the same school year. Application forms for scholarships may be obtained by writing to The Registrar, Mount Royal College, Calgary, Alberta, and applications must be submitted on or before June fifteenth of the year in which the award is to be made.

- A. The DR. G. W. KERBY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP of \$250.00, offered to a student of Grade XII who enters as a resident student for a Commercial or University course. The student completing Grade XII in not more than two successive years, making the highest average first class honors standing in the Grade XII June departmental examinations among all who have applied for this scholarship, will be eligible for this award.
- B. The H. E. Howard Scholarship of \$50.00, offered to a student of Grade XI or XII who enters as a resident student for a Commercial course, awarded on the same basis as above.
- C. The DR. G. D. STANLEY Scholarship of FREE TUITION to a High River student who takes a first year University course in Mount Royal College as a resident student.
- D. GRADE XII STUDENTS WHO PURPOSE ENTERING UNIVERSITY OR COMMERCIAL COURSES
 1. Ten scholarships, one of \$100.00 and nine of \$35.00 each, are offered to students in Grade XII in the Calgary High Schools who enroll for a first year University or Commercial course in Mount Royal College. Awards will be based on Grade XII June departmental examination results. The student making the highest average mark among those who have applied for one of these scholarships will be eligible for the \$100.00 scholarship, the next nine \$35.00 each.
 2. Ten BOARD OF GOVERNORS Scholarships, one of \$100.00 and nine of \$50.00 each, are offered to students in Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Drumheller and Red Deer High Schools who enroll as resident students for a University or Commercial course in Mount Royal College. Awards will be based on Grade XII June departmental examination results. The student making the highest average mark among those who have applied for one of these scholarships will be eligible for the \$100.00 scholarship, the next nine \$50.00 each.
 3. Ten scholarships, one of \$100.00 and nine of \$50.00 each, are offered to students in Grade XII in the High Schools outside of Calgary, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Drumheller and Red Deer who enroll as resident students for a first year University or Commercial course in Mount Royal College. Awards will be based on Grade XII June departmental examination results. The student making the highest average mark among those who have applied for one of these scholarships will be eligible for the \$100.00 scholarship, the next nine \$50.00 each.
- E. GRADE XI STUDENTS ENTERING GRADE XII IN MOUNT ROYAL COLLEGE

Ten BOARD OF GOVERNORS Scholarships, one of \$100.00 and nine of \$50.00 each, are offered to students in Grade XI who enroll as resident students for a Grade XII course in Mount Royal College. Awards will be based on the student's Grade XI standing as filed with the Department of Education. The student making the highest average standing in this group among those who have applied for one of these scholarships will be eligible for the \$100.00 scholarship, the next nine \$50.00 each.
- F. GRADE IX STUDENTS ENTERING GRADE X IN MOUNT ROYAL COLLEGE

Ten cash BOARD OF GOVERNORS Bursaries, one of \$25.00 and nine of \$10.00 each, are offered to students in Grade IX at Bowness, Montgomery or Calgary School Division No. 41 who enroll as students in Grade X at Mount Royal College. Awards will be made on the basis of Grade IX Department of Education examinations.
- G. A bursary of \$50.00 each to all ministers' children who become resident students at Mount Royal College and a reduction of 10% in the tuition fees of ministers' children who become day students.
- H. A bursary of \$50.00 for all candidates for the Ministry who become resident students at Mount Royal College and a reduction of 10% in the tuition fees of all candidates for the Ministry who become day students.

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
