Message to the College

I was reading the other day about a portrait painted by an artist called Oliveira. It is the picture of a man striding through a vast landscape of fog on a vague and ill-defined world. The picture is alarming, not because it tells us that life in this world has lost its shape and meaning, but rather because the face of the man is just a blur, and he cannot be recognized as an individual.

Ours is a perplexing world of fear, anxiety and frustration, in which the landscape of the future may be blurred. Even more alarming than this is the fact that we have lost our individuality in a world of mass-produced thoughts and feelings. The modern man is in danger of being more like an I.B.M. machine than like a creative personality. Faceless, and without identity, we wander in the wilderness of a fog blurred world.

One of the main purposes of Mount Royal College is to restore to young people the feeling of individual worth which is each person's priceless heritage. To attain this purpose is very difficult for we must struggle against the impersonality of the present. That we have been partially successful in our efforts can be seen in the growth of individual students and in the increased desire of the students to direct their own affairs. A student who has really involved himself in the life of Mount Royal College will find himself more of a recognizable individual than he was when he came here.

As many of you leave our college for the world of work, or for the halls of study, our desire is that you never allow yourselves to become lost in the mob life of our day but that, at all times and in all places, you will be a person of worth in the community in which you will live.

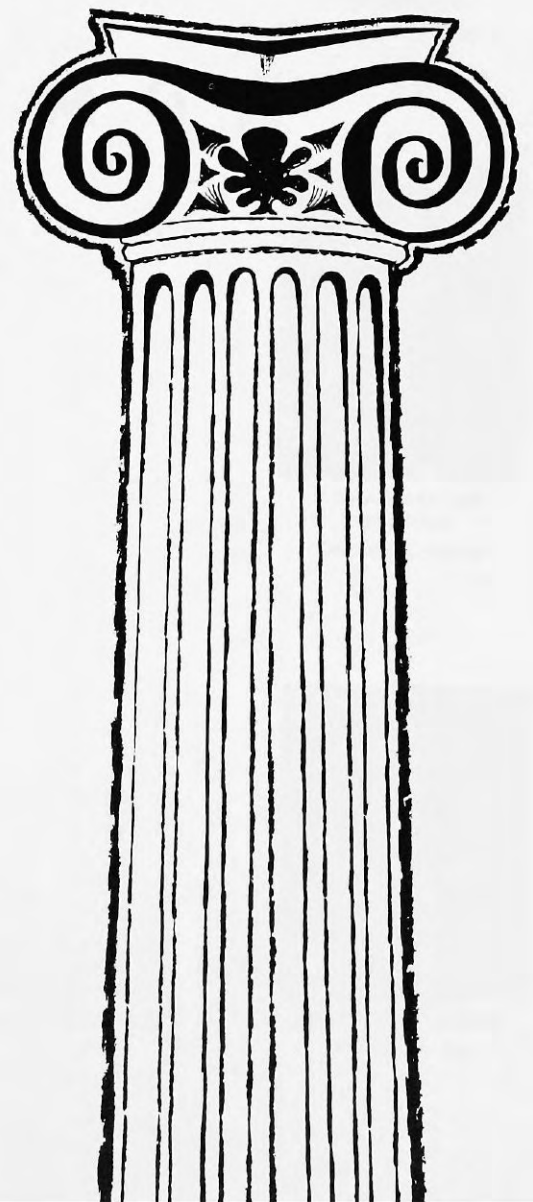

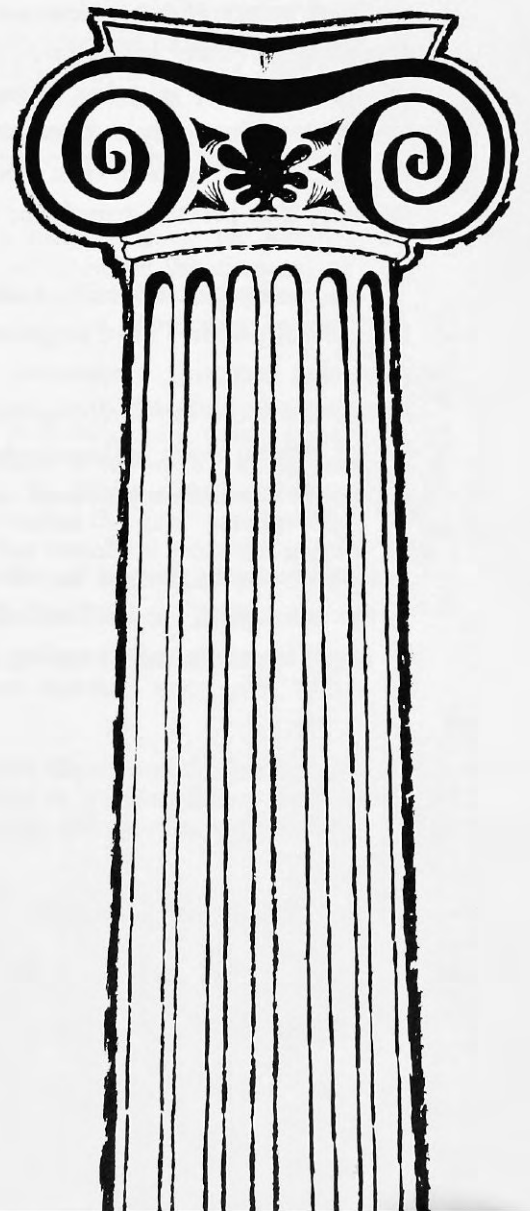

The rate of change is often so great that a person with a normal life span will undoubtedly be required to face many situations which find no parallel in history. For this reason, there is nothing more certain in life than the fact that we will be called upon to make many momentous decisions.

In lieu of the instability of our present world, perhaps the greatest decision facing us will be how to make democracy desirable to all peoples. To do this we know that a formula for the application of universal tolerance must be found.

It has been said that the future lies in our hands, and so it is our responsibility to make this world a better place in which to live. Do you know that if each different nationality in the world was represented by one person there would be 1,000 people? Only 60 of these people would be white. But these same 60 would control over 60% of the world's wealth. Also $\frac{3}{4}$ of these 1,000 people go to bed hungry every night.

Herein lies our challenge. We need only to look at Berlin to see how the people under communist domination, who know about the freedoms of the West, look to democracy for help. The great strides of Communism in world domination have become quite evident to all of us in the last year. At the present moment, it might easily be said that the world is teetering between communism on one side and democracy on the other. However, the seriousness of this statement becomes even more appalling when we consider the fact that the majority of the people in the Western world today, do not realize how close we are to accepting the ideologies of Communist indoctrination.


It will be for us to decide in which world we wish to live. If we go out from here tonight and build a fence around our lives, we will deserve the eventual enslavement that will come upon us. To insure the freedoms we now enjoy for ourselves and future generations, we must stand up and fight for democracy in every way we can.

Mount Royal has persistently endeavoured to develop in us the ability to make decisions which will help us meet the many complex problems confronting society today. Our college is somewhat like the Golden Milestone set up in the Roman Forum by Augustus: From it roads lead everywhere. Yet, every student here has benefited from the special attention provided by the Mount Royal instructors. It has been this opportunity that will help us to meet these challenges and make the necessary decisions.

Perhaps such decisions will be easier if we set a goal and follow through. John Masfield, who ran away to sea and later became poet laureate, once said: "All I ask is a tall ship and a star to steer her by."

In explaining, he went on to say; "Progress may seem slight, and the horizon far away, and the port only a dot on our map, but so long as we complete a stage of the journey every year, steering by our star and making the most of opportunity, we have cause for happiness."

Message to the High School

Every age has its fetish. Today the fetish of educational institutions is "training". On every side we, the students, are told that we must have "schooling" to earn a good living, or to "make our mark", or to provide for our families. Unfortunately there is a solid core of truth to these little sermons. Our parents have learned that it is the "prepared" citizen who is chosen for the important position; it is he who "measures-up" to the standards set who succeeds. All of this is true. Today young people face a grimly competitive society. There is hope for all; charity for the few; but success only for the trained. BUT (let's capitalize it) there is also a great danger.

Many years ago a very wise man said:

*"For what shall it profit a man if he shall
gain the whole world and lose his own soul?"*

I am going to give this quotation a very narrow application, and paraphrase it for a particular situation — ours.

*"For what shall it profit us if we get all
the necessary training and lose our-
selves in the process?"*

It is the fear that we will not differentiate training and education that oppresses me; that we will not (educate) lead forth and establish definite personalities within us, but will be satisfied to give these minds of ours a training that will make it possible for us to exist only. If we do this we have forgotten the purpose for which schools in a democracy were established. We have sold our birth-right and, which is worse, ourselves for a higher standard of living.

When we look back on our years in school, let us be able to see stirrings within us of that divine (for it is of God) curiosity about people, about beauty, and about ourselves. Let us, right now, begin to consider our training important but our "education" essential. Let each of us be able to say of our life at Mount Royal and beyond that "I went in as a child, but I emerged as a well-trained individual who had discovered within himself depths and strengths and potentialities that only God had known existed.

To you, graduates and undergraduates, at Mount Royal College may I, on behalf of the Staff and myself, wish you continued success in your "educational" life.

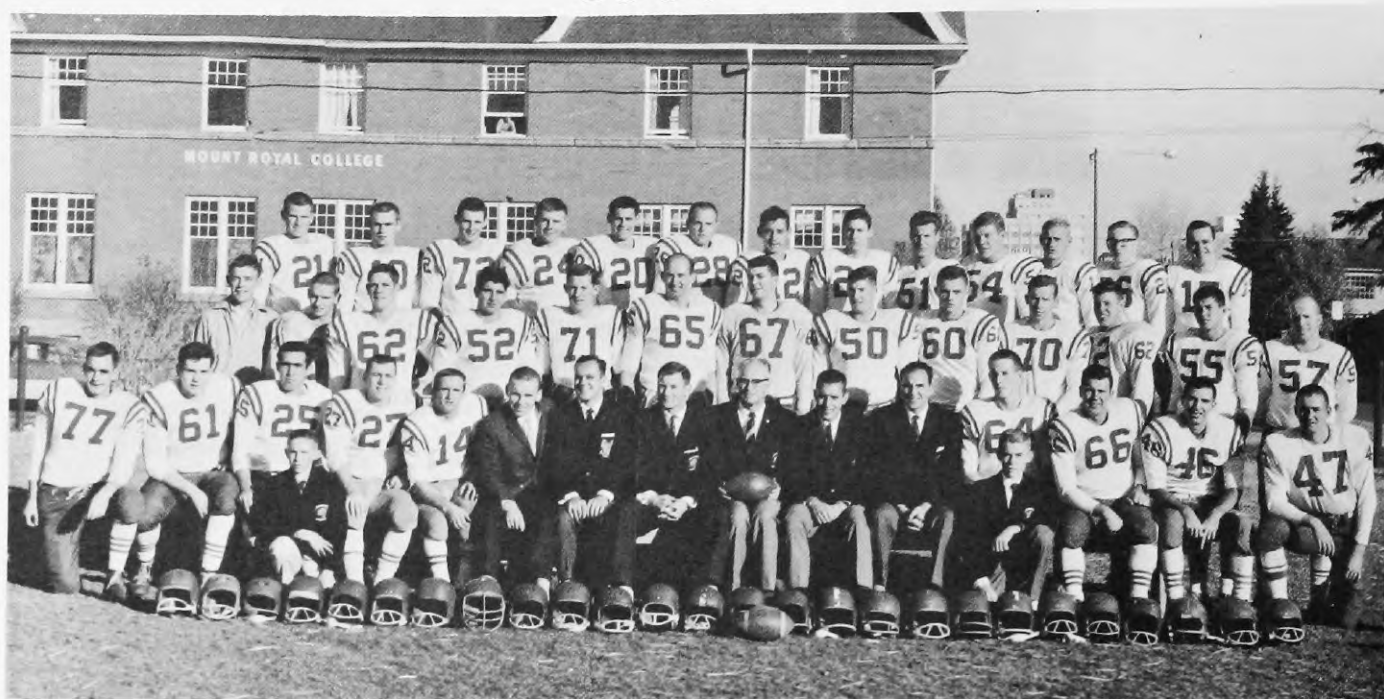
In 1955, Mr. Borger married an Edmonton girl and now has 5 children. His extra curricular activities includes baseball, hockey, football and raising kids.
