

The Kerby Memorial Building and Dr. G. D. Stanley Gymnasium







DEDICATION

This issue of the VARSHICOM is being dedicated to Mr. Justice Clinton J. Ford in recognition of the many years of service that he has given as vice-chairman of the Board of Governors at Mount Royal College and as Chairman of the Committee on the Conservatory of Music. Mr. Justice Ford has alway found time from his many other duties to attend many of the activities of the College. It is particularly appropriate that this year book be dedicated to him at a time when the University of Alberta has honored him by conferring upon him the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws and Letters.

Born on a farm near Corinth, Ontario, Mr. Ford was educated at Tillsonburg High School, Aylmer College and for general proficiency received the Prince of Wales Gold Medal at the time of his graduation from Victoria College, Toronto in 1902.

In 1909, one year after he received his degree at Osgood Law School, he travelled west, residing in Calgary one year before he was called to the Bar.

Two positions in his early career were his appointment as City Solicitor and his membership in the law firm of Ford, Miller and Harvey. Then in 1942 he was raised to Judge of the District Court. In 1945 Justice Ford received his appointment to the Trial Division of the Supreme Court. At present he is a Judge of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of Alberta.

Though fond of most sports Mr. Ford is particularly enthusiastic about hockey and football.

Perhaps one of Mr. Ford's keenest interests lies in his work at the Y.M.C.A. Of the 23 men who are life members of Canada's Y.M.C.A., only two reside in the West, one the lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, the other Mr. Justice Ford. At present he is Vice-President of the National Council of the Young Men's Christian Association and is a past president of the Branch in Calgary.

In 1984 Justice Ford attended the World Council of Churches in Amsterdam as a delegate of the United Church of Canada.

A word of advice from Justice Ford to the Graduating Class is: "There is time for work and there is time for play. Try to develop your own personality by hard work, properly balanced with recreation and without imitation or envy of others, and above all ally yourself with the Christian cause."
